Several members of the Society of the Rocky Mountains took the voyage to Scotland to attend the Clan's AGM. Jim and Lisa Robertson (Co-Presidents), Jorge and Heather Hidalgo (Events Coordinators and RM Society Athlete), Jeff Kohr (Events Coordinator), Rachel Bessette (Newsletter and Historian) and Kathy Robertson (Council Member) attended the week-long activities with approximately 75 other members from around the world. Representatives from the U.S., Australia, New Zealand, Canada, England, France and other countries participated in this most special AGM celebrating both the Chief's 80th birthday as well as his 35th anniversary as Clan Chief. The SORM members rented a beautiful AirBnB cottage just outside Pitlochry that could not have been better accommodations and within easy striking distance to all corners of the Highlands.

Alexander Gilbert Haldane Robertson of Struan was born in 1938. He was the youngest of four children, and only son, of Langton George Duncan Haldane Robertson of Struan and his wife, Laurie. He succeeded his father as chief in 1983 and is the 23rd Chief of Clan Donnachaidh. Struan married in 1965 Bridget Kenyon, younger daughter of Ronald and Celia Kenyon. He has one son and two daughters and three grandchildren. His son, Alasdair Gilbert Robertson of Drumachuine, younger of Struan, is his heir. Struan and his family are members of, and actively support, the Clan Donnachaidh Society. The annual general meeting of the Society and the associated weekend of social activities organized by the Society in clan country each year provide a regular opportunity for clanspeople to meet with him and his family.

Festivities kicked off with a social on 10 August where representatives were able to meet and introduce themselves, get to know each other, and meet many members of the Clan Council, International Officers and the Chief himself. Many activities were scheduled for the week including tours of the Clan's former lands, castles and other sites by authors James Irvine Robertson and Donald Reid, who has recently published a book about the Clan and he is selling to raise funds for Clan operations. Several of us participated in a tour of the Culloden battlefield where Government forces (Read: English!) defeated Bonnie Prince Charlie in the final Jacobite uprising. It was a brutal battle employing all the tactics and strategies on how NOT to fight a battle. Looking back, I think we should have visited Bannockburn instead! 

Grandma Lilly's Shortbread From Kathy Robertson

Kathy writes: I got this recipe from a great lady named Alice who used to bring shortbread to all the Clan functions many years ago. She called it, "Grandma Lilly's shortbread recipe" - and I have a grandma Lilly as well! Go figure! She experimented before she moved away with chocolate, lemon and lavender flavors, but I haven't been brave enough to try my own experimentation yet!

Preheat oven to 325

- 4 cups flour
- 1 cup sugar (I put in 3 additional tablespoons)
- 2 Tbs Corn Starch
- 1 pound (that's 4 stick folks!) salted butter

Mix it all together and press into a 9 x 13 metal pan with a flat bottom. Bake for 40 minutes here in Denver. Final color should be evenly cream colored with no dark edges. Cut while HOT - pierce pieces with a fork.

Tips:

I mix all the butter (very soft - but NOT melted!), sugar and cornstarch together first until incorporated. I add 2 cups of flour and stir in. Then the hard part - the final 2 cups of flour! I do a lot of cutting in and mix until I can't see any more flour. Dump it all in the pan - it will be very crumbly - and press uniformly flat with your hands. I have tried a mixer - it HATES the last cup of flour. I have tried a wooden spoon and have broke 2! I use a silicon 1" wide sturdy spatula stick, and only hands will do for pressing into the pan. When HOT - and I mean less than 2 minutes after it comes out of the oven, I use a wide metal spatula to loosen the sides, then use that to cut it into the piece size I want - pressed straight down into the shortbread. Note: A pizza cutter makes a MESS of the hot shortbread! I cut it into pieces then decoratively pierce with a fork for the traditional look. It is much easier to get it out of the pan after about an hour than the next day when it is cool and very firm! And it's delicious served warm!

Clan Donnachaídh

Atholl, lying in the centre of Scotland, is one of the most fertile and beautiful stretches of the Highlands. It enters history as a Pictish kingdom from whose ruling family sprung the royal house of Dunkeld that ruled Scotland from Duncan I in 1034 to Alexander III in 1286. A line of Celtic mormaers, later earls, governed its thousand square miles until the heiress to the earldom was wed to David of Hastings in 1242. The title left its original family and was later granted by the Stewart kings to kinsmen on no less than nine different occasions.

Though the title may have been able to be passed on through the female line, much of the land went down through males. Specifically, through Conan, son of the 3rd Celtic earl, to Duncan (Donnchadh in Gaelic) – who was the first chief of the Clan Donnachaidh and a close adherent of King Robert Bruce. At the request of the king, Duncan named his son Robert and his descendants called themselves the Robert-sons, hence the clan is both Clan Robertson and Clan Donnachaidh. The chief is known as Struan (Gaelic for 'streams'), which is the name of the parish at the core of the clan lands. The clan first erupted into history in 1379 when, probably as

The clan first erupted into history in 1379 when, probably as the result of a land dispute, the chief's sons joined with a couple of bastards of the Wolf of Badenoch, the Earl of Buchan, to launch a raid into Angus. The Lowland gentry put on their armour, mounted their warhorses and caught up with the marauders as they drove their stolen cattle back to Atholl.



A couple of fierce clashes high in the heather resulted in defeat for the Angus men. Sir David Lindsay, just back from defeating all comers at a jousting tournament in front of King Richard II on London Bridge, skewered a Highlander with his lance. The story goes that his dying opponent wriggled up the shaft and dealt such a blow that it split the steel covering the knight's foot and left him with a wound most grievous.

The incoming Stewart earls hungered for the Clan Donnachaidh lands with which they were surrounded. In 1451 the chief received a crown charter for them as a reward for capturing the assassins of James I but this protection was insufficient in the anarchic years after the country lost its leaders in the 1513 catastrophe of Flodden. The clan chiefs were children and the earls of Atholl their guardians. Within a few decades the earl had executed one, his cousin, and taken half the clan estate and left the rest laden with debt.

With such a powerful magnate in charge of the regality of Atholl, it could have been the doom of the clan. But the Robertsons were too entrenched. Stewarts came in, but a good half of the earl's vassals belonged to the clan Donnachaidh and they continued to follow their chief. Added to this, the clan's interest in defending their country was shared by the new Stewart inhabitants. So they usually fought together as Athollmen.

In Montrose's campaign in 1644–1645 they were under the command of the Tutor of Struan. Montrose won every battle in which they fought. At Inverlochy, he singled out Duncan Robertson, a blacksmith, for congratulations. He had killed 19 men by himself. In fact, 'The Robertsons of Athole' were long esteemed the best swordsmen in Scotland. A tales goes that Robertson of Lude once cut off the two buttons on his adversary's shirt collar as a hint that his head might follow.

The Clan fought in the 1689 Rising. Their young chief, Alexander, 13th of Struan, was the first to raise his sword for King James when he led a troop of horse against his fellow students at St Andrews University when they tried to proclaim William as king. The clan regiment was bounced by dragoons after Klliecrankie and Struan was captured. He escaped, was recaptured, escaped, fled to France and his lands were confiscated. He returned, without a pardon but safe in the midst of his clan. In the 1715 Rising he led a brigade of 500 that the earl of Mar said was the strongest contingent in his army. He was captured at Sheriffmuir, escaped, was recaptured, and yet again escaped to France.

He was back home, illegally, by 1726 and safely cosseted in the heart of the clan. Come the '45 and the old man was out and at it again. The clan was present at Prestonpans, Falkirk, and, like the rest of the Athollmen, suffered terrible casualties at Culloden. Afterwards, the Redcoats devastated clan country and the estate was taken over by the Forfeited Estates Commission. Struan, well into his 70s by this point, was allowed to live out his days and died in 1749.

Of the Robertsons, one 1893 source says: 'The last final migration of the agricultural population took place during the American War, when certain manufactures were started in the villages at the entrance to the Highlands, Blairgowrie, Dunkeld, etc. and the Robertson Clan being the nearest to these villages flocked into them.... The Robertsons are now found in great numbers in the large towns of Scotland and throughout England and the British Empire, but these last can almost all trace back to the time, rarely more than a century ago, when their ancestors lived in Scotland. In all families, whether living in Scotland or elsewhere, the tradition of a Perthshire origin is universal.'

It is worth mentioning that the Clan Donnachaidh chiefs never cleared their tenants from their land. One consequence of this was that the debt each chief inherited from his predecessor eventually meant that all of their land was sold. Another consequence, it could be said, is the strength of the bonds that still hold the 25 worldwide branches of the Clan together. The first clan Society was started in Edinburgh in 1825. After various vicissitudes during the World Wars, it sprang into vigorous life, built its own museum and is now raising money to buy and endow the redundant Clan Kirk at Struan, where lie generations of chiefs and clansmen.

In August this year, a special celebration will be held in Clan country to mark the 80th birthday of Gilbert Robertson, 23rd of Struan, and the 35 years that he has been chief.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING of

THE CLAN DONNACHAIDH SOCIETY held in The Tryst, Church of Scotland, Pitlochry on Saturday 18th August 2018 @ 10.00am

Members were welcomed, especially those attending the AGM for the first time, by Gillespie Robertson, Chair. The Chief was in attendance on the podium with Council members and Clan Secretary Catriona Macaulay. Apologies for absence were received among others from Jean Robertson of Struan and from long-time attendee Linda Myers of the Mid-West Branch in USA, to both of whom the meeting sent best wishes for better health: and from Jenny Stark (Chair of Rannoch and Highland Branch)

2017 AGM minutes were approved and signed.

- **Council Report by Chair.** The Chairman reminded the meeting that 2017 had been a challenging year and that the challenges were still with us. Nevertheless echoing his remarks in this year's Annual the Council felt that the good news outweighed the bad.
- Because of the loss of rental income from two tenants leaving the Clan centre, and the multiple costs, including professional fees, associated with the resulting changes, we had taken a financial hit of some £40,000 in 2017. This would be seen in the 2017 Accounts which the meeting would be asked to approve later. In the near term our finances would continue to be stretched; but a new long-term tenancy and other arrangements with House of Bruar, including significant improvements to our two buildings at House of Bruar's expense, were positive long-term elements. During the coming 12 months the Council would be focusing on future business plans to take advantage of any and all opportunities for improving both our finances and our Museum.
- The major item of good news, after many months of complex negotiations, was the finalisation of the acquisition of Struan Kirk a few days earlier by the new Struan Kirk Trust. The likes of Oliver Cromwell and the Duke of Cumberland might have in the past destroyed such castles as Clan Donnachaidh's chiefs had owned, but the Kirk was and is the Clan's true spiritual home, and its preservation for future generations was hugely important. Approximately a quarter of the Trust's initial funding for the purchase and for estimated immediate/essential repair costs had been provided by the Clan Society and its fund drive with the branches, and the Society was expected to contribute towards future maintenance costs. It is essential that fund drives continue.
- In general the Council felt that we had settled in well with our new status as a full Scottish Charity, with a Clan Secretary experienced in charity matters, a series of new sub-committees set up within the Council to address specific/major elements of our activities, and a new Policy and Procedures Manual all in place. The first item in the Manual spells out how we strive to behave towards both the outside world and each other. It adopts wording suggested by Christy Duncan Lange, our IVC: "To give more than we receive."
- A very special event for the Society was the handover to us earlier in the week by the Trustees of the 51st Highland Division a Division of the United Kingdom's armed forces which had a heroic 20th century battle record but has long since disappeared through various mergers and rationalisations their splendid Memorial statue of a piper which stands at the entrance to the Clan Centre at Bruar. It has been given to the Society for permanent safekeeping, together with funds to assist us in future maintenance. The handover reflected the gradual running down of the Trust as the last survivors of its great historical campaigns were dying out.

Financial Report followed by Acceptance of Accounts (copy documentation attached.)

- The Chair and Clan Secretary presented a summary of the Society's formal Accounts for Calendar 2017 and spelled out the highlights. Acceptance of the Accounts was proposed by Duncan Huie, seconded by Tim Duncan and agreed.
- Andrew Duncan requested clarification on whether any Trustees/Members of Council other than the Clan Secretary receive any payment from the Society. The Chairman confirmed that applicable Charity law permits payments to Trustees only for specific services of value or for reimbursement of approved expenses incurred on behalf of the charity. All such approved payments are minuted and are recorded in the relevant year's Accounts.
- Council were asked from the floor whether we could quantify any increase in the value of Clan Society's property as a result of the work done by House of Bruar. It was explained that accounting conventions require regular valuation of buildings, but this had not been done recently. The Chair undertook to ensure that revaluation would be carried out for our 2018 Accounts and this should give us guidance on the question. It is possible that valuation might be done by a suitably qualified Member as an in-kind contribution; otherwise the Clan will need to cover the cost.

Nominations to Council

- All Council Members due to retire in rotation in 2018 had expressed willingness to continue, Anne-Lise Robertson who was due to retire next year wished to stand down one year early: this was accepted reluctantly and Anne-Lise was warmly thanked for all her past work, and also that of her late husband. There were no new nominations.
- Donald Reid and Jonn Duncan who had both been co-opted onto the Council in March 2018 were willing to continue, and the Council had expressed the unanimous wish that Donald accept the vacant position of Vice Chair which he was willing to do. Judy Harkin who had also been co-opted in March 2018 was unable to join Council permanently due to other commitments. All of the above Council moves were proposed by Christy Duncan Lange, seconded by Ron Hobson and agreed.

IVC Report (copy attached)

The Chair expressed the members' deep appreciation of the IVC's work and emphasised that she had received extraordinary support from her husband John.

Secretary/Membership Report

Catriona Macaulay spoke about the two new projects that she had instigated with Council support since the last AGM.

- **Donnachaidh Stones** had been featured on the website and also in the Clan Secretary's Newsletter at the end of 2017 and in the 2017 Clan Annual. Feats of strength involving The Stones will form part of the Pitlochry Highland Games in 2019, and it is hoped there will be different categories with trophies won for each. A request for help and support in this project was made to enable it to move forward.
- Clan Donnachaidh Award launched by the Clan Secretary in the Scottish government's Year of Youth 2018, open to all school pupils in highland Perthshire. Nominations for the award can be made by school teachers, support workers, family members, friends and neighbours. In less than 500 words each person making a nomination has to describe why they have made their choice. This project was given great support by the Highland Perthshire Education Committee. The 2018 winner was Calum Ryder of Pitlochry who was given his award, a Trophy and £100 cash, at his School prizegiving held in the Pitlochry Festival Theatre in June. Calum as part of his prize has also been invited to attend the 2018 Chief's Dinner.
- The Chair expressed appreciation for the Secretary's initiatives and the hope that these and further new ideas for raising the Clan's and the Society's profile would attract new memberships and receive continued support from existing members.
- It was intimated that Struan Kirk would have the Clan Society's annual service as its first event under its new ownership on Sunday 19th August 2018. There would also be a renewal of wedding vows between Clan Members Rikki and Jennifer Robertson before the church service.
- **Clan Annual Report / Journey Home** read by Judy Harkin (copy attached). Appreciation was expressed to Judy for the excellent quality of the Annuals produced under her editorship see also footnote below.
- **DNA** Tim Duncan gave a brief outline of continuing encouraging progress, with participants in the project now around 2,000 and an outstanding recent success being the identification of our first Chief's (Duncan Reamhar's) DNA.

Affiliated Branch Reports

Reports were presented orally or read out, all to great acclaim, by visiting Presidents/Chairmen or other representatives of the following branches: Arizona, Carolinas, Florida, Gulf Coast, London and Southern Counties, MidWest, New South Wales, North East, Northern California, Pacific N West, Rocky Mountains, Southern California, Spain, Upper MidWest, and West Canada. While a few branches were struggling to maintain or increase interest and memberships, the general tone was positive and encouraging.

Subscriptions

Brian Donaghy proposed that the UK annual membership subscription be increased by £5, with a similar flow-on increase to overseas members joining the parent Society. Discussion followed on the continuing and pressing need to bring in new members, and the view was expressed that increased subscriptions could be a deterrent, especially in the case of overseas members who had to pay local branch fees before considering a subscription to the parent Society. It was agreed that Council would take Brian's comments on board and consider the issue again next year.

AOB

The Chair asked the meeting to recognise the presence of our Honorary Vice President, distinguished Clan historian and previous Clan Annual Editor Dr Jean Munro, who has been an outstanding contributor to the Society's work over many decades.

Christy Lange requested that the Clan Council have an updated photo taken.

The Chair mentioned that as Life Membership is literally for life and some members live for a very long time, older members with Life membership might like to consider making a donation to the Society if they could afford to do so.

Intimations: Brian Donaghy intimated he had items which he would be selling after the AGM with proceeds to go to the Society.

NOTES: Our Articles of Association provide for the appointment of the Clan Annual Editor at the AGM. This item had to be omitted from the proceedings this year because discussions on this matter were still taking place in Council. Since the AGM, the role has been filled by James Irvine Robertson, a previous Editor and a widely respected expert on Clan history, on the unanimous vote of Council members, with formal confirmation to be included in the Agenda for next year's AGM.

Our Articles also provide for the appointment or reappointment at each year's AGM of our Accountants/ Independent Financial Examiners. This item was inadvertently omitted from the AGM agenda not only in 2018 but also in 2017 and possibly at previous AGMs, probably because Walton Kilgour have filled the role for so many years now. The Council has undertaken to ensure that the point will not be omitted again in future AGMs.
