Financials were reviewed in detail with the Council members. The broad strokes are as follows:

- 2023 Robert Burns Dinner We netted approximately \$1,100 overall. Most of those funds will go to pay for festival costs for the rest of the year.
- We still have a large sum of money in the operating account as we are still ironing out expense details with the RBD venue. Once that is finalized, our account should be greatly depleted.
- Year To Date, we are at a negative income because we took in most of our RBD 2023 income at the end of 2022. That revenue wouldn't show up in the 2023 #s. Once we receive revenue for the 2024 RBD at the end of this year, we will right the ship once again.
- Membership dues are low so far this year but that is expected as most members renew during the Scotsfest in Estes Park, Colorado, and at the end of the year.
- We're also working on an alternative platform other than PayPal. We continue to have federal taxes withheld, even though we are a social club and do not make significant profit.

Return to Scotland

This year marked Alexander Gilbert Haldane Robertson of Struan, 23rd Chief of Clan Donnachaidh's 40th year as Clan Chief and his 85th birthday. It was cause for several of us Rocky Mountain Scots to make the journey, once again, to Scotland in celebration. Eight Society members planned an extended trip that encompassed the Clan's Annual General Meeting and Gathering in Pitlochry. For several of us, this was our 2nd, 3rd and even 4th time making the trek and it won't be our last!



The group included Jim and Lisa Robertson, Jeff Kohr and Pat O'Rorke, Heather Hidalgo, Kathy Robertson, Rachel Bessette and Amber Dobie-Grove. Most of us had ventured out together before, including 2018 for the Chief's 35th year and 80th birthday. So, we knew this would be a very special time together again. This time, the group decided to plan an extended vacation to stretch our legs to parts of Scotland we had yet to discover.

Glenuig 11-15 Aug.

Upon arrival to Edinburgh airport, we managed to secure a van that held all of us and our luggage for the 5-hour journey across the country. This was a huge score as we had originally reserved 2 cars — not as much fun. Being together in one vehicle makes all the difference. We booked the most magical cottage



by the western seashore in the town of Glenuig, just down from the Isle of Skye, with a population you can count on your hand. Not really knowing what we were getting into, it turned out to be one of the trip's highlights as we were surrounded by the unspoiled beauty of the far reaches of Scotland. The cottage was built on a small hill overlooking an inlet off Loch Ailort. We woke each morning to sound of seagulls and the mist coming off the bay only feet away. While in Glenuig, we toured a small part of the coast including the Castle of Tioram, and the remote distillery of Adnumarchin.





As many know, the roads in Scotland are most challenging, often single lane, blind corners and hills, much less driving on the opposite side of

the road and with a manual transmission. This made our travels most interesting as often we hung on for dear life expecting a large lorry, farm combine, hairy coo, or herd of sheep to greet us around every corner. Within only a few miles from the airport, Jeff, our trusty driver, was mastering the roads. It still did

not seem to alleviate the sounds of 6 women gasping for air every time we encountered an on-coming vehicle! We managed to get ourselves onboard the ferry from Mallaig to Ardmore, Skye where



we spent the day sightseeing around Scotland's most infamous island. Stopping off at the Fairy Pools, Talisker Distillery, Dunvegan Castle, and the main town of Portree. Not enough time!

As chance would have it, a pub was located literally next to our cottage – the only one for many miles. We quickly established ourselves as "friendlies" to the locals and enjoyed several pints and drams listening to a local band one evening making promises to each other we'd all be back someday.

Aberfeldy 15-20 Aug.



We chose Aberfeldy as we had passed through the town on previous trips and had admired its charm. The town sits on the River Tay and is large enough to have several restaurants and pubs and



groceries but small enough to walk end to end in only a few minutes. Our BnB was a very nice 5-bedroom stone house with a large kitchen, dining room and library. It was only a 2-minute walk to center of town. Several of us hiked the Birks, a wonderful climb up the river and falls where Robert Burns penned "The Birks of Aberfeldy", a song lyric, in1787. He was inspired to write it during a tour of the Scottish



Highlands. From Aberfeldy, we could reach Pitlochry in about 20 minutes, an easy drive to get to the events of the Clan's Annual General Meeting (AGM) and Gathering. The Welcome Reception was special this year as the Chief and Chieftain Alasdair urged the Rocky Mountain Scots to lead the battle cry as it had become very popular 4 years before when the Rocky Scots bellowed it out for all to hear. It has become our Society's moniker and we especially appreciate that Scotland has taken it on wholeheartedly.

Next day was a bus tour to The Scone Palace. What



a magnificent place. Scone was, from at least the 9th century, the crowning-place of the Kings of Scots and home to the Stone of Scone, more commonly referred to as the Stone of Destiny. Kenneth MacAlpin (traditionally known as the first King of Scots), Shakespeare's Macbeth, Robert the Bruce, and Charles II number amongst the 42 kings of Scots inaugurated and crowned at Scone.



Of course, no trip to Pitlochry would be complete without a stop at the House of Bruar where we all shopped along with the rich and famous and ate wonderful things you won't find in too many other places. It is also there where the Clan Donnachaidh museum is and has been well kept and continuously improved upon. Both the museum and House sit along the Falls

of Bruar, a popular spot for Robbie Burns and the very heart of old Robertson lands. That evening, we stopped by Robertson's Spirit Shop for a tasting joined by Alasdair and Council Chair Jonn for a few wee drams. We followed that with dinner at our favorite restaurant, The Old Mill.



The next day the AGM was held and our newly appointed Council Chair, Jonn Duncan, took on the daunting task of coordinating the meeting in a well-ordered fashion to impart the state of the Clan to all. In sum, Clan Donnachaidh is on solid foundation and in very good hands with Jonn at the helm and an enthusiastic Council in support. That evening



we attended the event we had been waiting for, the Chief's Gala at the Atholl Palace, one of our favorite places in the whole world. We arrived, dressed to the nines,

and entered this hallowed place feeling like royalty ourselves. The Benefits of Membership

A question that is often raised is "What do I get for the cost of the membership?" A very good question since there are many places you can spend your hard-earned money. Here are just a few.

Local membership dues go to:

- -Fees for the 5-7 annual events the Society participates in annually. Each event charges a fee to set up a tent space and this fee can be anywhere from \$35 to \$250+. Events are our largest cost per year.
- -Maintenance and upgrade of the Society's trailer, tent, tent materials, event consumables. A large cost each year involves purchasing consumables for the events (i.e., ice, water, scotch, cups, beads and candy). Additionally,

the creatin. Ordering and purchase of new signage or renewing old/outdated materials for the tent can be substantial. Annual registration of the Society's trailer.

- -Society's operations costs. Membership cards, mailings, paper and ink, etc
- -Access to The Society's newsletter. Our newsletter is typically published twice per year to keep members up to date on what's happening with regard to events, Council activities and other information we want to share.
- -Robert Burns Dinner. Cost involved with the basic operations of the dinner are often absorbed by the Society to help reduce ticket costs. Members may receive a small discount on dinner tickets as well.

There are no paid members of the Rocky Mountain Scots. All positions are strictly

voluntary. Above all, membership allows those interested in researching their heritage, enjoying the wonderful cultural history of Scotland and sharing others'

International membership dues go to fund the operations and maintenance of Scotland's Society:

- -A Yearly Clan Annual. The Annual includes information about the Clan and reports from the various Clan Branches around the world. Articles relating to clan history, archaeological digs with a Clan connection are featured as well as articles about battles, and various aspects of Scottish life.
- -Your dues help to maintain the Clan Centre and Museum which preserves and promotes the Clan's heritage and artifacts. In addition to the artifacts preserved, there is a Reading Room where members can discover more about the Clan, the Society and its history.
- -The International Society gives grants to various bodies which have a bearing on the Clan. Examples include sponsorship of the Poet Chief's archery medal at St. Andrews and a Donnachaidh memorial stone at the recently opened Visitor Centre at Culloden.
- -The Clan Secretary works in the Clan Centre by answering queries from members and non-members alike, helping to spread the word about Clan Donnachaidh.
- -An Annual General Meeting (AGM) is held

each year, attended by Clan members from the four corners of the earth. A report of the year's accomplishments is given and plans for the new year voted on. It is a wonderful opportunity to meet the Chief and his family, Donnachaidh cousins from around the world, and to experience the joy of being in Scotland, to bask in the joy of being "home".

In summary, the job of the Clan Society in Scotland and the Society of the Rocky Mountains here locally, is to maintain the heart and spirit of our heritage. This affords us a unique view of our family roots as more than an excuse to don a kilt. Your annual dues are needed to preserve this evidence of our heritage for our children and grandchildren.

A Brief Thank You

Hello everyone,

I'd like to say a huge thank you to everyone who participated in Colorado Tartan Day this year. The weather was nice, and it was a fun event. I'd like to shout out to the Buchanan's who volunteered both days helping in the pub.

I am writing to share some news and to ask for some feedback from you. As you know we have tried to focus on the Clans with our Tartan Day event, keeping costs low. We have also kept admission free to the public, to encourage attendance. This year saw our expenses triple, depleting our resources for next year. We also struggle with a lack of volunteers and "active" members. These situations are leading the CTD Council to consider sunsetting the festival permanently. For those of us who have worked so hard to keep this event alive this is not something we take lightly. The simple truth is we only have about a dozen active members (most of us aren't young anymore) and a shortage of funds for next year.

To attempt a festival next year, we would need all the following:

- 1. Several sponsorships in the thousands of dollars.
- 2. An increase in registration fees for clans and vendors. Minimum of \$65/space for clans and \$130/space for vendors.
- 3. Charge admission fees (we currently don't have enough volunteers to staff this).
- 4. Additional volunteers or active members.

We need to know if you can absorb these increases.

Can volunteer or know people who would volunteer?

Do you know a business or person who would sponsor the event, and are YOU willing to pursue a sponsorship from them? We have sponsorship packages from \$2500 and up.

We need your feedback on these two items, to help us determine how we proceed with the future of Tartan Day.

Donnachaidh Early History

River names are the most ancient in the landscape and the explorers who named Scotland's greatest river 'smooth and quiet' water were the same folk who first met the Taw in north Devon, the Tavy in Cornwall, the Tyne, and even the Tiber. The early inhabitants began to clear the forests and left signs of their passing in dozens of enigmatically cup-marked boulders, in great stone circles, in tumuli where they buried their dead. But those who named the river Tay are unknown. Their story can never be told, nor that of the hundreds of generations who followed them and called this land their own. Not until the Picts, some two millennia ago, do we have a name for the people who lived here and what follows is mainly an account of the Gaels who supplanted them. They have gone, too, but their genes live on in the modern resident of Highland Perthshire, as do those of the Picts, and their ancient predecessors. The culture and even the language may be changed by successful invaders but the human stock absorbed them and remained much the same.

Kenneth McAlpine made his capital at Dunkeld 1,150 years ago. By then the city already had a history going back three hundred years. When St Augustine landed in Kent to bring Christianity to southern England, St Columba and his missionaries had already converted the Picts and a monastery nestled on the bank of the Tay. The Viking raids down the west coast destroyed the religious settlement at Iona. Half the monks sought refuge in Ireland, the others came to Dunkeld bearing the remains of their founder. Once more the saint's bones were laid to rest but. in the chaos of successive raids by the Norsemen, their location was forgotten. Twice the early abbey was burned and it was damaged several times in later tumults but the current roofless state of much of the building owes itself to a couple of local lairds and their enthusiasm for the destruction and theft of Papist establishments during the Reformation. By then, the 16th century, the variation on the clan system as practised in Atholl was at its peak. This was the country of the Stewarts, Clans Menzies and Donnachaidh. The last of these, the Robertsons, were the earliest recognisable clan between Dunkeld and Dalnacardoch. Their chief can trace his line from the Picts, the old Celtic kings and earls of Atholl, and the kindred of St Columba. In the pleasant phrase to show ancient associations with the district, they were said to be the first to 'make smoke' in these straths. The first seat of the chief was at Struan on a conveniently defensible mound above the river Garry,

some twenty miles north of Dunkeld.

Their power began to wane when the line of the old earls died out and the title was won by Robert, High Steward of Scotland. He married a daughter of Robert Bruce and came to the throne as Robert II. The Stewarts, like the Menzieses, came from France, arriving into Scotland in 1136 in the train of King David and his queen, Margaret. Strathtay, Strathtummel and Strathgarry were for centuries dominated by Stewart lairds.

The Stewart line of earls died out in its turn, and the last heiress was won by the Murray earls of Tullibardine. As earls, marquises, and dukes of Atholl, they ruled Atholl until modern times but, although they held feudal superiority over this country, clan and kin loyalties built up over centuries sometimes led the people into conflict with their master. It provided a rich brew to be distilled into history.



INGREDIENTS

1lb potatoes, peeled & cut into chunks 2 c. Shredded cabbage

z c. Silicudea caobage

1 carrot, grated

1/2 shredded sharp cheddar

cheese

Salt & pepper to taste

- 1. Boil the potatoes over medium heat for about 10 min or until fork tender, drain and mash, set aside

Kathy Robertson hosted us. 2 p.m.

Secretary—Minutes from previous council meeting of 5-21-2023, Approved as submitted by Nancy Bigley.

President's Report—Jim shared the International Council Meeting via Zoom from July 16th, 2023. Specifics will be addressed in each of the additional minutes as appropriate, but it is shared as an additional attachment to these minutes.

Vice President's Report—Heather was unable to attend however sent an email requesting the following be discussed:

- *The PayPal account/dues paid, burns ticket sales, etc. via PayPal and what we need to do to get the account back in our control and what to do as far as getting a Tax ID, Tax exempt status, private foundation,
- What are we considered? Private Operating Foundation, Social Club? To have the tax-exempt status. Would like to get the banking/tax part of accounting all straightened out for our Clan society.

I understand they are holding our money at PayPal until we figure this out!?

• She has the event coordinator procedure manual (binder) and need to get it back to the Clan. Is there one of these for all the Council positions? President,

- VP, Membership, treasurer, secretary, Web master, newsletter, Etc.? If not, we should consider it (perhaps not a binder for each but a protocol description for each position that can be put in a binder) especially for the next volunteer(s) coming in, would be very helpful to have a guide as to what duties/expectations are for each position.
- New Clan Stamp- Time to get a new one. A new larger more decorative stamp with our Gaelic/ English war cry under our crest and larger size.
- Burns supper plans—where are we?

Treasurers Report—Lisa Johnson still waiting for response from the Hilton regarding final costs.

Breakdown of Current Financials:

Wells Fargo Balance as of 7/31: \$3,757.63 PayPal Balance as of 7/312: \$239.96

Lisa went through the financials again and forwarded them to Jim for review. They both agree that we made approximately \$1,100 on the RBD. Year to date we have a negative net income of (4,156.84). The main reason is that we took in most of our RBD 2023 income at the end of 2022. That revenue wouldn't show up in the 2023 #'s. Once we receive revenue for 2024 RBD at the end of this year, we will right the ship as it were.

- There is concern by all of council that hotel has not sent final balance for Robert Burns even though they have been contacted several times since January. Jim and Lisa will still keep working on this. Do what they can to protect our funds in clan account with Wells Fargo.
- PayPal—There are still tax concerns and confusion. Lisa is going to contact Mindy Bolen to assist with closing the current account. Mindy needs to assist because the account was originally opened in her name. There are some forms that will need

completing. There are new guidelines for what is and isn't taxable.

- Tax exempt status—Jim is going to consult with John Duncan, our National Chair to help with finding out if there is an umbrella tax exempt # and status already available. If not, then any assistance John might be aware of to accomplish this. Another branch maybe has this and can assist with completing forms, etc. Lisa will also continue to follow up as well.
- Recommend that we reorganize the website, taking the current PayPal off the site. When the new one is set-up we can have him update the information. Membership dues, recommend these be cash or check only until we can get this sorted out.
- Encourage membership push at Long's Peak Highland Games so we can build up our treasury. Secretary's Report—Nancy Bigley is looking for the original Guide material but believes these should be in the binder that has the By-laws, the Charter information and includes the descriptions for Officers. However, these will need to be updated to reflect many of the changes. Some duties have shifted, we have large display items, tents, trailer, etc. and we should possibly include pictures to assist people.

Background—Our by-laws were basically the same as International. Membership locally, as with international guides, anyone that is interested in Celtic ancestry is acceptable. No one needs to show "proof" of the lineage to become a member of Clan Donnachaidh Society of the Rocky Mountains. This allows for adoption options as well as interested friends to join us. We can accept anyone interesting in joining us.

Stamp--We also need to check with International for approval/use of wolf heads on the new stamp as several years ago it was requested that we not

use the 3 wolf heads as this was the Chief's family crest. Some branches have received written permission to use the wolf. In the past it was preferred that all the Septs use the crest with the raised hand holding the crown and we should be respectful with a written request if we want to use the wolf head.

Membership—Lisa Robertson: Membership dues: we currently have 26 paid local members and 20 active international members. We need to have a reminder sent to all members to renew. Doing a membership drive.

- We also need to purchase new membership cards perhaps with a different design, easier to read, etc. The council approved Lisa/Jim to create new ones and get them ordered to have to send out after Estes.
- One question that has been raised is "what do I get for being a member". The reality is that the local membership dues, any of the drawing activity funds, any of the sale items such as pub glasses, funds raised locally go to paying our fees for us to represent the Clan Donnachaidh at local festivals (5 annually), the upgrade of display items, the purchase of the trailer to transport the items and cover some basic costs of our Robert Burns Dinners. The newsletter is a way to communicate events and activities and is distributed in Spring and Fall.
- The additional international membership funds go to Scotland to support your membership in Scotland, receive a membership card, and one receives the Annual News Booklet that includes all branches throughout the world.
- We want members to be involved as much as possible so we can represent and participate in the festivals. We hope people also enjoy joining in at our additional events such as our Yule Party, going to Celtic Week at the Colorado Renaissance Festival.

Reminder: Lisa is resigning as Membership chair.

Events—Jeff Kohr: We didn't have representation at CSF this year. We have one final official festival for the year which is Long's Peak Scottish Highland Games, Estes Park, Sept. 8-10. Jim is planning on going up Thursday for the set up. Anyone available to assist is greatly welcomed and appreciated. Please let Jeff know when you might be available to help with the tent throughout the weekend so we have coverage and people can take breaks. Also let us know who will be available for breakdown and packing everything up.

Yule Party is Dec. 2, Jay offered to hold it at his home again this year. And the council accepted.

This would mainly involve signing up for the 5 festivals we want to represent Clan Donnachaidh at; scheduling the transport of our tent and display trailer, set up at each festival and then break down and return. Jay is willing to transport for us if necessary if the new coordinator doesn't have ability.

over the Newsletter. We will get him set up to provide a Fall and Spring newsletter.
